The Wayne County Sheriff's Office reports that a dump truck driven by Kenneth Morrell, 42, of Rush Mendon Rd., Town of Mendon, was south-bound on Route 350 just north of Route 441 when it failed to stop at the intersection and was struck by a vehicle driven by James E. Taylor, 53, of Buffalo Street, Marion.

Taylor was transported to Strong Memorial Hospital by Mercy Flight for treatment of his injuries. Morrell, who was not injured in the collision, was issued a ticket for Failure to Stop at a Stop Light.

Hogweed Threat Grows

You might spy giant hogweed in a nearby field, pass it on a trail or notice it by the roadside, its striking crown of white flowers towering over other plants.

If you do, stay away. One touch can bring a great deal of pain or worse.

"You could actually sustain the kinds of burns that could land you into the hospital," says Brett Shulman, MD, lead physician of the Rochester General Medical Group Center for Dermatology.

That danger could be close by. A state Department of Environmental Conservation map shows giant hogweed infestations of 400 plants or more in parts of Wayne, Ontario and Cayuga counties.

Wayne County has eleven public, county-run parks. Each one is uniquely different with a variety of accommodations for visitors to enjoy including pavilions, boat launches, tables and playgrounds. Some pavilions are available to rent, which results in revenue for the county. However, according to the county website, 2011 is a rebuilding year for the Parks Department. There are a total of eight pavilions that were identified, constructed as far back as the late 1970s, that are currently not available for rental because they were demolished

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
